STORYSHARING®

- A framework for the identification and sharing of personal experiences by people with severe communication disabilities and those who share their lives
- Based on research and observation of everyday anecdotal narrative
- Focus is on building identity, relationships & social capital, belonging



Storysharing® features

- Inclusive
- Multisensory - use of simple VOCA
- Collaborative/co-constructed
- Process over content
- Face to face, dynamic
- Active listening

- Certificated training programme

Theoretical perspectives

- Ethnopoetics (Dell Hymes)
- Dialogic encounter (Meininger)
- Mutual cognitive environments (Sperber and Wilson)
- Empathy through mirroring and imitation/

Belonging in conversation the role of repetitions



When I was small

- Story exchange between S (special school) and G (mainstream school)
- Patterns of repetition
 - S = 11 signs (7 are echoed by G)
 - G = 18 signs (climax of story uses 4 of S's signs)
 - Theme and emphasis: intonation and stress
 - Ve-e-ery/very very



Bad Leg Cat

- Co-constructed narrative between 3 tenants with ID and 5 staff, 100 seconds.
- Story is about the cat going to the vet: the narrative is completed in the first 15 seconds.
- Remainder of dialogue is a riff on the meaning of illness in the home, led by a tenant (Victoria)



Repetition patterns: Bad leg Cat

Total utterances = 48

Repetitions = 65% of total

Repetition dynamics

- Staff are as likely to echo tenants as tenants are to echo staff
- Victoria chooses significant elements from the story to repeat; these are not random
- Lexical repetitions are distinct from prosodic repetitions; warp and weft



In conclusion

- Narrative devices used in informal, anecdotal telling establish a web of connections, harmony, promoting empathy.....
- « Imitation brings a person into the same experiential context as the one imitated » *Jones, 2009*
- « **If you want to become more empathetic, mimic how people act and move their body** » *Iacobini, 2009*



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
